

Interviews with 2 ladies actively involved in WDP

Kathleen Rodger

Kathleen Rodgers has been involved with WDP for over 30 years since she came to Biggar in 1985 and joined the Guild. It was only three years before someone asked her to take over and she is still doing it at 88 years old!

Kathleen was a missionary for 10 years in Kalimpong in India, near Darjeeling. The mission school, with a grand view of the Himalayas, had 600 children mostly the result of dalliance between tea planters and local women. During her time there she wasn't allowed home for five years and her only link with the outside world was a little radio, and of course letters from home that took 6 weeks to reach her.

Her interest in WDP is prayer. She says that, "It's good to get the people of the world praying together. Often we do the Bible Study in our weekly bible study group. Sadly the service is mostly women, 3/40, but strongly supported by The Guild. The minister will sometimes read the lesson". However Kathleen worries that being organised by women keeps the men away but feels that it is good as it opens eyes to the rest of the world.

Allison Penderleith

Allison is very active in her local community and church. She is currently president of the Guild but she gathers people from far and wide into her Qi Gong classes (a type of Chinese exercise). "How did I get involved? Almost fifteen years ago the current WDP co-ordinator stated that she was giving up and asked for volunteers. I was the only person who came forward. I co-ordinate material for local organisers within Lanark Presbytery and deliver material on receipt each autumn. I organise our local service in Carluke/Law and also in Lanark. One church takes a turn each year including Church of Scotland, Roman Catholic, URC, EU and Christ Church, rota system. Both the service in Carluke/Law and in Lanark have been reasonably attended and most of all enjoyed. We also enjoy fellowship with a cuppa following each service."
