FELLOWSHIP OF THE LEAST COIN (FLC)

When I joined the WDP Scottish Committee in 2018, I must admit (coming from England) I had never heard of the Fellowship of the Least Coin (FLC). However, having read more I now understand the rich ministry and commitment of its members. 2021 will mark 65 years since the prayerful ministry of FLC began. What is now a global, ecumenical movement began with the vision of one woman, Shanti Solomon. Following war torn years, her vision was of women being called to pray for peace, justice and reconciliation; to pray for local, national and international issues and concerns. Since the Covid lockdown many women have been made more vulnerable and Fiona Buchanan reminds us of the situation in Scotland. Therefore, the need for this FLC commitment and ministry is as important

as ever in our World today, and God continues to call women to this ministry of prayer.

No need to look far these days to uncover the reality that we still have a long way to go to achieve gender equality. Our lives are littered with stories and often dangerous experiences women face daily because of their gender throughout the world. Piece them together and they form a web of haunting experiences and voices declaring that violence against women is the greatest human rights

scandal of our time.

In Numbers 27.1-11 we read the story of Zelophehad's daughters, and the gender-based rights abuses that women commonly experienced at that time. This included an absence of inheritance rights, especially when a father died leaving only daughters. The result was a male relative inheriting his property instead of his daughters, a practice ratified by Mosaic Law. This repressive law was challenged by the daughters of Zelophehad, resulting in a significant change to the legal status of all Israelite women born into a family without a male heir. They identified an injustice and spoke out, challenging the patriarchal traditions of the time and forging a new path for women to have their rights recognised.

Many churches throughout the world have already clearly demonstrated their commitment to responding to gender inequality as a fundamental matter of faith. In Scotland, the Church of Scotland's Gender Justice Project seeks to assist ministers and congregations to support women in their midst. Many churches also engage with broader public campaigns on violence against women, including taking part in Thursdays in Black, and the 16 days of activism to end gender-based violence. The Scotland chapter of Side by Side, the faith movement for gender justice, shines a light on the challenges that faith communities face when working towards gender justice.

It is refreshing to see churches recognise that culturally-held gender norms and values have created a landscape in which expectations about men and women's respective places in society are damaging – for everyone. We see violence in the form of domestic abuse directed at women specifically because they are women and linked to society's expectations of women. It is up to all of us to make explicit and challenge these damaging gender constructions, and the structures and ideologies in the Church and in society that perpetuate gender inequality and lead to violence against women. We need women, and we need men, to be those challenging voices.

PRAYER

God, you taught us to speak out for what is right. We pray for an end to violence against women; that governments will protect the human rights of women; and for women and men to be partners for change, working together with mutual trust and respect. God of equity and justice, thank you for your vision of a world where gender justice will bring fullness of life. Amen.

Using the FLC prayer, we hold these intentions before God. After each prayer- time we put aside a coin of the least value, in our local currency. Funds raised are sent annually to the International Committee to be used for between 35 and 40 Project Grants Worldwide, with other Emergency Relief. Below are the European Projects funded in 2019:

European Project for Inter-religious Learning – Study Course V in Bosnia and Herzegovina, Bosnia & Herzegovina, The Netherlands, US\$ 3,600.

To educate and inform 10-15 EPIL female students from Bosnia and Herzegovina of various age and professional background, Christian and Muslim women, and strengthen their capacities in the field of open and

constructive interreligious dialogue and broaden the international network of Muslim and Christian women in interreligious dialogue in Europe.

Material assistance to homeless women seeking asylum, French courses, "family moments" and outings, France, US\$ 4,000. to provide material and psychological support to women seeking asylum and being suspended from State cover - i.e. social assistance and reliable accommodation during a part or the whole of the procedure.

Prevention of breast and cervical cancer in women in rural areas of Vojvodina, Serbia, US\$3,370. to provide breast and cervical examinations to help protect women's health and prevent breast cancer in Serbia.
