A History of the World Day of Prayer

1887		Mrs Mary Ellen Darwin James, President of the Woman's Board of Home Missions in the Presbyterian Church of America, was concerned for the poor immigrants
		from Europe and the Orient who had arrived in America
		looking for a new life. Believing that those who
		persistently prayed would become advocates of the
		powerless, she issued a call to set aside a "Day of Prayer
		for Home Missions when there shall be confession of
		individual and national sins, with offerings that will fitly express the contrition".
1890		Two Baptist ladies, Mrs Lucy Peabody of Boston and Mrs
		Helen Barrett Montgomery of Rochester, New York, made
		an appeal for a Day of Prayer for Foreign Missions.
		This resulted in an increased observance of both days.
1919		The two interdenominational mission bodies set up a
		National Committee to prepare worship materials and to
		correspond with local communities.
1920		A call was sent out for all churchwomen to come together
		on the <i>first Friday in Lent</i> to pray for Christian mission in
		the whole world.
1922	Canada	Women were invited to start their own organisation,
	Cunudu	sharing materials from the USA. News of the Day of
		Prayer began to spread around the world.
1928	Jerusalem	An International Missionary Conference was held. The
1720	Jerusulein	Day of Prayer became known as <i>the World Day of Prayer</i> .
		Mrs Mary Grace Forgan, a member of the United Free
		Church, brought news of the World Day of Prayer to
		Scotland.
1930	Scotland	The first World Day of Prayer service was held, probably
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		in a house. Theme: That Jesus may be lifted up.
		Written by Miss Helen Kim - Korea. The day became
		known as the <i>Women's World Day of Prayer</i> in many
		countries.

1932	England	The Women's World Day of Prayer began,
		spreading toWales in 1933 and Ireland in 1934.
1944	World-wide	The hymn "The day thou gavest, Lord is ended"
		was adopted as the World Day of Prayer hymn.
1948	World-wide	The Praying Hands were used as the symbol for
		the Women's World Day of Prayer.
1966		The Service was written by Scottish
		<i>Committee</i> . Theme: Ye are my witnesses.
1967	America	Women from 42 countries were invited to
		discuss plans for an International Committee which
		would be responsible for future planning.
1968	Sweden	The International Committee (ICWDP) was
		formally started and the <i>first Friday in March</i>
		became the World Day of Prayer.
1980	Scotland	Celebrated 50 years of the Women's World Day of
		Prayer.The word 'Women's' was dropped from the title.
1982	ICWDP	A new logo developed by women of Ireland was
	16	adopted as the international logo.
